New Customer Information System SET TO GO LIVE FEBRUARY 12

What you need to know

As we get ready to go live with our new customer information system, please be aware of the following dates:

Tuesday, February 6, 2018: This is the final day you will be able to make a payment through our "old" system. Bill4U is unavailable after this date.

Wednesday, February 7, 2018: February billing statements, January's usage, will be mailed.

Thursday and Friday, February 8–9, 2018: The customer information system will not be available to process electric bill payments. We will be processing electric bill payments manually. You may continue to mail in your payment or drop off your payment at our office.

Monday, February 12, 2018: The new and improved customer information system goes live. Since this is the first day our customer service representatives will be working with our members' accounts in the new system, we ask for your patience during this transitional period.

Monday, February 19, and Wednesday, February 21, 2018: Customer service representatives will be available to help members sign up to pay online. This will be held at Jackson Electric from 4 to 8 p.m. on both dates.

Saturday, February 24, 2018: Customer service representatives will be available at Jackson Electric from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. to help members sign up to pay online.

March, 2018: All members will receive a new and improved billing statement in the mail.

If You Currently Pay Online

None of your log-in information will transfer to the new system. Once you are logged into the new system, you will have to set up your account information. New account numbers will be assigned, and will be listed on your March billing statement. Please contact our office to receive your account number after February 12 if you would like to set up your online account before you receive the March billing statement.

If you currently receive paperless electric billing statements, you will have to reset that option in the new system. All accounts will receive a paper billing statement in March.

Credit/Debit Card Payments

To protect your identity, your credit/debit card account number will not transfer to the new online bill pay system. After you set up your account, you will have to re-enter your information.

One-Time Pay Option

This is a new payment option that will be available with the new system. You will be able to make a one-time payment by credit card, savings or checking account. Registration will not be required. There will be a link on our website to access the Pay Now page. More information on this new option will soon be available.

Payment by Credit/Debit Card by Phone

Jackson Electric will have a designated phone number for credit and debit card payments. You can continue to call our office with a card payment, but you will be redirected to a secure phone line where your payment will be processed. We will be publishing a credit/debit card payment processing phone number in our February issue.

Mobile App

Information will soon be available if you are interested in downloading Jackson Electric's new mobile pay app. This will be available for Android and Apple supported smartphones.

As we get closer to the go-live date, more information will be mailed directly to you and published in this magazine. Jackson Electric's employees are committed to making this transition as smooth as possible for members.

Obligations of the Board of Directors

The board of directors provides leadership and guidance to Jackson Electric Cooperative's management. Their primary responsibility is the establishment of long-term, broad objectives, purposes, and visions for the cooperative. The directors, as stated in Jackson Electric Cooperative's Policy 202:

- Ensure the operations are consistent with the articles and bylaws, understand the corporate philosophy, act in good faith in handling the affairs of the cooperative, avoid conflicts of interest, and represent the best interests of the members.
- Have or acquire the minimum knowledge and skills necessary to direct the affairs of the cooperative.
- Make every effort to attend all meetings of the board and to study materials that are sent prior to each board meeting.

Excerpt from Article III, Section 2. Election of District Directors..." Nominations for director to represent the district shall be made from the floor at the district meeting, and in addition to the other qualifications required by these bylaws, the prospective director must be a resident of the district he or she is to represent. Election shall be made by secret written ballot."

RULES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

These rules are set in accordance with Jackson Electric Cooperative Bylaws, Article II, Section 7. Jackson Electric Cooperative's annual meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 13, 2018, at the Lunda Theatre in Black River Falls.

- 1. The meeting will be conducted in accordance with Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised edition.
- 2. Any speaker must be recognized by the Chair before speaking.
- 3. Only members and duly registered guests will be recognized by the Chair; each person so recognized must give his or her name.
- 4. Unless otherwise approved by the Chair, those recognized are to limit their questions and comments to three minutes, with any rebuttal limited to two minutes.
- 5. Questions and comments from members and duly registered guests will be in order during old and new business sessions, and at the conclusion of the officer reports, if invited.
- 6. No resolution affecting Jackson Electric Cooperative may be submitted by any member, unless written copies have been received by Jackson Electric Cooperative by January 13, 2018. This will permit time for review by the Jackson Electric Cooperative Board of Directors to make its recommendation to the meeting as to approval or rejection.
- 7. No signs or handouts will be permitted within the building of the place of the meeting, except such handouts as required for the official conduct of the Annual Meeting. No handouts made available outside of the building will use the name of the Cooperative, its letterhead or logo to imply that the Cooperative supports or opposes any resolution.
- 8. No demonstrations shall be held within the building of the place of the meeting.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT PORTABLE ELECTRIC SPACE HEATERS

All portable electric space heaters are 100 percent efficient, regardless of the manufacturer's name, and watt for watt, they all provide the same heat output and cost the same to operate. For example, a 1,500-watt milkhouse electric space heater produces the same amount of heat as a 1,500-watt household quartz or infrared electric space heater.

If you're planning to purchase a portable electric space heater, it's important to know how many watts the space heater draws. The higher the watts, the more heat it will deliver and the more it will cost to operate. Most portable heaters do not exceed 1,500 watts because a higher wattage would overload a typical 15-amp outlet, and likely trip a breaker or blow a fuse.

Know the size of your room you plan to heat with your portable electric space heater. A 1,500-watt heater, which can heat

space heater. A 1,500-wait heater, which can heat a room that's about 150 square feet, delivers approximately 5,120 BTUs/hour. BTU, a British Thermal Unit, is a unit of measure for the output of heating and cooling systems. Typical residential furnaces (whole house) range from 45,000 to 120,000 BTUs/hour. It would be impossible to heat your whole house with one electric space heater. We do not recommend the use of multiple electric space heaters as they will dramatically increase your electric bill.



WATER HEATER PRICES

Jackson Electric has the following water heaters available for purchase by members:

- 50-gallon Rheem: \$415 plus tax (no rebate available)
- 105-gallon Marathon: \$1,100 plus tax (\$400 rebate at the time of purchase if a load management receiver is installed)

Water heaters with a load management receiver continue to qualify for free parts and labor between the hours of 8 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on regular working days. Repairs done after-hours and on cooperative-recognized holidays will be charged a \$150 service fee.



IS WOOD A CONDUCTOR OF ELECTRICITY?

This was a question asked when the Black River Falls fourth-grade class recently visited Jackson Electric Cooperative. Journeyman Linemen Matt Bush and Jesse Hansen demonstrated how a tree branch can conduct electricity when they simulated how a branch can be like a breaker to light a lamp. The safety lesson: Don't climb trees that are near power lines.

Jackson Electric and the Black River Falls FFA Chapter teamed up to talk with the fourth-grade class about electrical safety during the FFA's Food for America program.
